I take this opportunity to point out that some of our non-biblical traditions distract us from the Bible stories and the true meaning of Christmas. However, I do respect most of the traditions as they call our attention to a celebration of the birth of Jesus. The patriarchal culture of the day celebrated the birth of a male child. But Jesus had no earthly celebration. Therefore, I am glad that we are able to provide a celebration in his honor. I am glad it is the greatest birthday party of all and that it is a big annual celebration. While we party and celebrate this joyous time of the year lets us remember and consider what a sad time it is for those that have recently lost a loved one. For them, Christmas just isn't the same as it used to be

I sometimes wonder what it would be like if we had the opportunity that was given to George Bailey in the Christmas classic *It's A Wonderful Life*. He was given the unique opportunity to see what the world would be like if he was never born. From this new perspective he is able to realize how much he has impacted the lives of those closest to him. After witnessing the powerful effect he has on his community, loved ones, and friends, he then began to understand just how wonderful life truly is. The daily life of a Christian is much like that. God calls us all to do the good that needs to be done in the world around us. The light is for everyone to see. The light I am referring to is Jesus. In John 8:12 Jesus said, "I am the light of the world" (NRSV). With Christ as our role model in life we too are the light.
